Previously, he was a management consultant at McKinsey & Company, serving senior management of mainly health care clients on strategy projects. He serves on the SHM Public Policy and Research Committees and is an Assistant Editor of the *Journal of Hospital Medicine*. He has published articles in journals, such as *JAMA* and *Pediatrics*, and given presentations on topics including health care policy, quality of care, adherence to evidence-based medicine, hospitalist systems, and nurse staffing. He was a pediatric hospitalist attending at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and is now on leave from a position as Assistant Professor at Cincinnati Children's Hospital. He has done medical volunteer work in multiple countries including Nicaragua, Dominican Republic, Bolivia, and Ghana. He completed residency at Children's Hospital Boston and medical school at Baylor College of Medicine.
